David M. Lampton is Hyman Professor and Director of China Studies at the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies, where he also heads SAIS China, the school's overall presence in greater China. Chairman of the The Asia Foundation, former president of the National Committee on United States-China Relations, and former Dean of Faculty at SAIS, he is the author of *The Three Faces of Chinese Power: Might, Money, and Minds* (2008) and *The Making of Chinese Foreign and Security Policy* (editor, 2001). He received his B.A., M.A., and Ph.D. degrees from Stanford University. He has an honorary doctorate from the Russian Academy of Sciences' Institute of Far Eastern Studies, is an Honorary Senior Fellow of the American Studies Institute of the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences, was winner of the Scalapino Prize in 2010, and is a Gilman Scholar at Johns Hopkins. Christopher K. Johnson is a senior adviser and holds the Freeman Chair in China Studies at CSIS. Mr. Johnson spent nearly two decades serving in the U.S. government's intelligence and foreign affairs communities and has extensive experience analyzing and working in Asia on a diverse set of country-specific and transnational issues. He has frequently advised senior White House, cabinet, congressional, military, and foreign officials on the Chinese leadership and on Beijing's foreign and security policies. In 2011 was awarded the U.S. Department of State's Superior Honor Award for outstanding support to the secretary and her senior staff. Mr. Johnson received his M.A. in security policy studies from the George Washington University.

Yukon Huang is a senior associate in the Carnegie Endowment in Washington D.C. Prior to joining Carnegie, he was the World Bank's Country Director for China. His research focuses on China's economic and financial prospects and its global impact. He was the principal advisor for the joint Chinese Government - World Bank "*China 2030*" report. Dr. Huang has published widely on development issues affecting China. He is the *A-List commentator* for the *Financial Times* on China and his articles are seen frequently in the *Wall Street Journal*, *Bloomberg*, *CNN*, *New York Times* and *Foreign Affairs*. Dr. Huang has a PhD in economics from Princeton University and a BA from Yale University.

Dr. Dickson's research and teaching focus is on political dynamics in China, especially the adaptability of the Chinese Communist Party and the regime it governs. His current research examines the political consequences of economic reform in China, the Chinese Communist Party's evolving strategy for survival, and the changing relationship between state and society, based in part on national public opinion surveys. His research has been supported by the National Science Foundation, the Smith Richardson Foundation, the US Institute of Peace, and the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars.

Dr. Sasha Gong

Sasha Gong is a scholar, a writer, and a journalist born in the People's Republic of China. Since coming to the United States in 1987, Dr. Gong has taught sociology at UCLA, George Washington University, and George Mason University. She also served as the director of the Chinese Branch at Voice of America. Currently, she is a senior analyst for Voice of America. Dr. Gong is one of the most-read columnists in the Chinese-speaking world. She is the author of several books, including *Born American: A Chinese Woman's Dream of Liberty*. In 2011, her book *Living Democracy*, based on her personal experience in political campaigns, was a bestseller in China. Dr. Gong holds a PhD of sociology from Harvard University.
